## **Injuries and Illnesses Open Roster Spots; Urgent Need** to Recruit New Players

May 5 General Meeting Notes... More Players Needed. Player Agent Tom Sansone urged members to continue recruiting ballplayers for the 2008 season as waiting lists have been or are going to be exhausted as injuries and illnesses take their toll. At this time, only League 5 had a waiting list of players, he said.

"Guys have been dropping like flies," Sansone said, adding that they have been "overextending themselves and getting hurt." Waiting list sign-ups can be "playing practically right away," he added.

George Hodsdon, L1 assistant commissioner, said there have been discussions of methods to deal with a player shortage as teams lose players, including the use of 11 players on the field.

Sansone also reported that of 88 multileague players, eight still owed dues for participating in their second or third leagues. The total of outstanding dues: \$650. The board of directors authorized Sansone to notify those owing dues that they must pay by June 1 or be subject to suspensions.

### Norm Blackwell Sr. is Honored

Congratulations to GSSC Life Member Norman Blackwell Sr., recognized by the Observer newspaper as a Medallion of Honor Recipient. In the publication's recent 45<sup>th</sup> anniversary edition, 50 leaders in the Black Community were honored. The "dedicated Little League coach and manager" was included in the sports section along with Dusty Baker and Ruthie Bolton.

Blackwell, who turned down a contract offer to play in the St. Louis Cardinals organization, took a civilian position at McClellan Air Force Base. He began coaching Little League in Oak Park in 1968 and remains an active member of the league's board.

Norman explained to the Observer that he chose to pursue sports and teach baseball because he grew up playing sports and taught them to his children. "I decided to help the youth in the Oak Park community because in my younger days I as from a low-income single family. We had very little money. In the 1940s playing sports didn't cost anything and sports kept me from getting into trouble." On passing his love of baseball to youth in the community: "Since I had four boys that were interested in sports, I said to myself, 'I better get involved.' I was involved in managing and coaching Little League Baseball for 20 years. We have had at least seven to 10 players go on to professional baseball that were in our Little League at one time. I also played high school and college baseball, including semi-pro baseball. I am 74 years old and still playing and managing senior softball." One of Norm's sons, Norman Jr., is a standout shortstop in League 3. Norm Sr. plays in League 1. #
