EMERGENCY INFORMATION UPDATE

Each member has been sent an emergency information card that can be filled out, inserted in a plastic envelope and kept in equipment bags or in a player's wallet. A handy baggage loop was supplied for attaching the card to equipment bags. This is far better than the old system of photocopying player applications that include medical and emergency information and having team managers maintain them for use by emergency personal should the need occur. "The board decided to use this new system because it has a greater chance of providing helpful information should you encounter a medical emergency on the playing field," said Player Agent Tom Sansone. League One started March 15 at Howe Ave Park with nine teams of 13 players, and one new manager, George Langan with Nielsen Real Estate taking over for Gordon Kennedy.

First two weeks went fine but the inch of rain April 4 knocked out all Monday games April 5. We started with 9 teams, the same as last year, as 8 teams would have too many players and 10 teams means the third game starts at noon, so in the summer some would end up with extremely hot temperatures.

When a team is going to be short a player they can get any player off the bye team, as long as they are one draft pick lower than the person that they are replacing. That player can only play catcher, right or rightcenter field.

All teams started off with a full complement of players but so far several have dropped out. Fortunately, two new players have signed up with Vic Vickland replacing Bobby Dippel (heart operation) on Wion's Body Shop, and Chuck Burns replacing Lee Elam on Bob Schwan's Avalon Hearing.

That leaves us very low on replacement players but fortunately we have Frank McNamara, Bob Silvis, Bob Havrilla, and Ray Gallagher coming back from knee operations. Recovery times vary but most think late June or early July.

After three games, Dick Horkey's Dumont Pest Control has all the muscle and will be the team to beat. #

resulted in 11 players on each team.

NOTES FROM GSSC BOARD MEETING. All leagues are running with full rosters and the club's budget is some \$2,000 in the black. Those were highlights of updates at the Board of Directors meeting on April 5. President Ray Mendonsa accepted reports from club directors, including Player Agent Tom Sansone and Club Commissioner Bob Smartt.

Club Treasurer Glen Cole reported that the budget for the current fiscal year has a surplus of \$2,060, which includes allocating \$4,000 for the club picnic in September. First VP Fred Fischer reported that the club's target for sponsorship fees has been met with 36 paid sponsors totaling \$9,050 in fees. New sponsors include American Medequip, Silver Cats, Geremia Pools, Cottonwood Estates and Uptown Cafe. Second VP Pete Ward noted that uniform shirts have been distributed and he cautioned that there will be a need to replace additional team shirts next year as old ones wear out.

The board discussed the status of club playing rules and agreed to rescind a base-running rule that had created some controversy. Directors also talked about ways to drum up more interest in the club to enhance recruitment of new players.

Rules. Based on reactions to a rule change that triggered some confusion, the board on April 5 did an about-face and decided to restore the ability of fielders to tag players out on the base paths. The decision was effective with games of April 6.

Directors continued to stress that runners causing an avoidable collision with a fielder should be called out or, if it is deemed flagrant or intentional, risk ejection. Managers should stress proper base-running techniques, particularly with new club members.

Batters' Box. Club Player Agent Tom Sansone, who also is a pitcher, said he is exploring future adoption of chalked batters' boxes with players required to stay within those dimensions. It is an unfair advantage for hitters to run up several feet toward the pitcher to hit a ball, he said.

Public Relations/Publicity. The board expressed intent to form a committee or task force to focus on club public relations and publicity, possibly including an advertising budget. The goal is to gain media coverage of GSSC play and explore placing of ads in local newspapers. Such a campaign would coordinate with the club's Internet web site and Dugout Chatter newsletter on ways to increase membership.

Wood Bat League. President Mendonsa said he wants to hear from members interested in forming a league that would be limited to wooden bats. It might play on Monday nights, he said. He has asked the Planning Committee to take a look at it.

Planning Committee. The committee is compiling a database of softball facilities in the area should the club find it advantageous to explore an alternative to the complex, according to Dave Vargo, a committee member. #
