2011 SIGNUPS: "DON'T BE LATE!!!"

Get your 2011 membership renewals in by Dec. 15 or risk losing seniority status, exhorts club Player Agent Linda McCollum-Greene. "Don't be delinquent and jeopardize your seniority status for the league or leagues of your choice." She also warns that those who sign up after Jan. 15 are subject to a \$20 late fee. As of Nov. 15, she reported these signups: L-1 60; L-2 31; L-3 37; L-4 31; L-5 28; L-6 21; L-7 12. At the Nov. 15 board meeting, President Bill Hill said players who haven't

SUNSHINE REPORT: BOB MITCHELL SR.

Life Member Bob Mitchell Sr., a major figure in senior softball who worked to spread the game throughout the nation and in goodwill trips abroad, passed away on Nov. 7. Complications from a blood disorder took his life at the age of 80, according to the Sacramento Bee's obituary on Nov. 12.

Fellow Golden Senior George Hodsdon described Bob as a "great ballplayer, friend and a person who made a difference."

Spending 30 years in law enforcement, Bob retired as a California Highway Patrol lieutenant in 1984. He joined the Golden Seniors in 1983. Five years later, he founded Senior Softball USA -- the world's biggest senior softball organization -- and the following year started international goodwill games to promote senior softball around the world. Travels included England, Australia, Italy, Spain, Hawaii, Russia and Ireland. At the Japanese world games, Bob was MVP as the USA took the blue ribbon. Mitchell was inducted into the National Senior Softball Hall of Fame in 1999. He retired from running Senior Softball-USA 10 years ago.

As a CHP officer, Bob was among the first on the scene at the Watts riots in 1965, and was accidentally shot by a Los Angeles policeman.

He also was a leader of the fight against drunken driving, authoring the book, "Drunk Driving and Why the Carnage Continues," which was published this year. As a motorcycle officer in Southern California, Bob set a record for DUI arrests, strictly enforcing the laws, according to his son, Bob Jr., who said in The Bee that his father "didn't care who he stopped; if they were DUI, he took them in. Honestly and integrity were utmost with him." Private services were held. #

BLACKWELL IS HALL OF FAMER -- AGAIN

Norm Blackwell Sr. is a 2010 inductee into the Northern California Senior Softball Association Hall of Fame. He receives his HOF jacket in December, having been included in the select group last summer.

This is the seventh HOF honor for Blackwell, who has been active in the GSSCS since 1985. He turned 77 this November. His past honors include the La Salle Baseball Hall of Fame, the Optimist Hall of Fame and the March of Dimes Hall of Fame. He has been honored for his play on the field and his work as a basketball referee.

Blackwell, who twice passed on professional baseball contract offers, is among the original members of the area's Tournament Players Association. He manages and plays on the Sacramento Gold tournament team, which has been highly regarded under his leadership for more than two decades. Norm's 1999 team won a world championship, one of many impressive trophies that he has collected over the years -- so many that his wife, Peaches, demanded that he add a room to their Oak Park home. where the walls are covered with countless plaques; shelves are loaded with trophies, both individual and team honors. His teams have won three world championship rings in senior softball.

(The plaques and trophies at his home are so numerous that he had difficulty finding his NCSSA Hall of Fame plague, the latest addition to the collection, when this writer visited him recently and took some photos, see below.) Folks at the community center near his home thought they'd display his awards. They didn't have enough room.

The Golden Seniors life member also was recognized by the Observer newspaper in 2008 as a Medallion of Honor Recipient, feted for his activities that included coaching youth baseball and providing food for needy in his Oak Park community. He and Peaches have nine children (including sons Juan and Orlando who played professional baseball, and Norm Jr., who played in college and now plays with the Golden Seniors), and many grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Senior Softball-USA News has reported how Norm was both a legend on and off the field, including his work with Oak Park youth as a Little League leader and his leadership in community affairs. He works with Glory Bound Church and Senior Gleaners to distribute food to the needy.



He is particularly proud of being honored as a bearer of the Olympic Torch through Sacramento in 1996, having been selected from more than 4,000 nominees.

Norm credits his ability to continue playing softball to knee replacement surgeries in the late 1990s and early 2000s, as well as medication to treat a once lifethreatening B-12 deficiency that forced his retirement from his civilian job of 36 years at McClellan AFB. He is delighted to pronounce himself "free of pain" in his knees. He has no thoughts of ever quitting softball, noting that his participation in the sport helps keep him active -- and healthy. #

OCTOBER GENERAL MEETING REPORT

The five board members present at the Oct. 4 general meeting strongly favor putting the by-laws, standing rules and playing rules on the club website to ensure consistent access. Club Commissioner Bruce Gilmore announced that he will break out the club-wide rules committee into day and night league sub-groups.

The board approved Gilmore's selection of two new league commissioners -- Bob Havrilla for L-1 and Allen Riker for L-5. The board also approved reappointment of the other five incumbent league commissioners, pending their agreements to continue.

1st VP Dick Latimer announced receipt of three new and four renewed sponsorships as well as a partial payment check donation from Teichert construction. He also said he will follow up on efforts to get non-paying sponsors to renew for 2011.

Player Agent Linda McCollum-Greene announced receipt of 109 checks along with renewal applications. Monday day L-1 (as usual) leads the way with over 30 renewals. (By Nov. 15, L-1 had produced 60 renewals, nearly double any other league.)

Entertainment Chair Lou Coppola announced some marketing ventures with the RiverCats are under way, and expressed hope that the club will be featured in the Pacific Coast League team's magazine and website. He said the club may be allowed to have a booth with a banner at a RiverCats game.

There was favorable reaction to George Hodsdon's suggestion that the club schedule a silent auction-style fundraiser for a winter general meeting to allow players to donate unwanted bats, gloves, etc. Several members said they desire to participate. #

ATTENTION PROSPECTIVE SELECT LEAGUE

PLAYERS: SIGN UP! Larry Campbell, commissioner of 70+ Select League 7, aims this notice at prospective players for both 60+ L-6 and 70+ L-7 (which possibly might lower its age limit to 68 if necessary to field four teams). Point number one: Prospects are reminded NOT to wait to be recruited or selected -- they should sign up now, the earlier, the better. Pre-selection by managers MAY become an option, but all prospects must be prepared for all players to be draft-eligible for any team. Point number two: managers and players who desire to maintain a highly competitive league are encouraged to actively recruit top-level players and get them registered. Point number three: A reminder that it is likely that an even number of players (e.g. 4 teams of 12 = 48, or 4 teams of 13 = 52 for League 7) will be selected/drafted and those not drafted may wish to consider switching to another league as it is unlikely that an undrafted player will have much chance to be assigned as a substitute or replacement player. #

WHAT IS A GOLDEN SENIORS LIFE MEMBER?

Every year, as we receive our renewal applications, there are calls from those wanting to know if they are a life member or qualify to be a life member.

Life membership: If you are 75 or older and have COMPLETED 15 years continued membership OR 80 years or older and completed 10 years of continuous membership, your name will be submitted to the Board of Directors for life membership consideration. If approved, you will be presented for membership approval at the next club general meeting.

On rare occasions, when a long-time member has severe health problems, the member may be considered for honorary life membership. Life members have an LM after their names on the general roster and receive a plaque presented to them at a general meeting ceremony. They also pay reduced dues.

Life membership was originally created to honor our long-time players with the thought that they would not be able to actively play the game much longer. This assumption was totally in error. Those who stay active have proven that exercise and social activity greatly extend their quality of life, with resultant life-spans exceeding normal actuarial statistics. Monday morning last year, in League One, we had over 40 players over 80 and seven over 85. In 2011, Dinny Watson will be playing at 91, proving that physical exercise and mental happiness do increase quality of life and longevity. #
