For two others the difference was no more than three runs. Fifty-seven runs were scored in the Wednesday night championship game when the losing team hammered eight balls out of the park, but just one of them counted as a home run. The rest counted, in effect, for no more than a base on balls.

EDWARDS LEADS PACK OF HYPER-HITTERS SURPASSING CLUB RECORDS

Hotter bats appeared to make light work of surpassing some all-time Golden Seniors Softball Club hitting performances during 2012.

Three-time .800 hitter Rich Edwards attained a smoking hot new record .882 average in League 6. Monte Miller's previous .844 high of 2011 was also bettered by Steve Schuler's .865 in L3, Geoff Miller's .860 in L4, Mel Tennyson's .847 in L4, Dave Bristol's .847 in L2, Dave Vargo's .846 in L6 and Darrell Heim's .845 in L4.

Other .800 club members in 2012: Jarvis Quenga .839 in L4, Dave Rhodes .824 in L5, Terry Urban .814 in L4, Wally Dorei .814 in L2, Keith Arnold .808 in L3, Steve Casarez . 807 in L3, and Monte Miller

.803 in L4. Miller is the club's sole four-timer, Edwards a three-timer, while Vargo joined Don Jackson and Emilio Lobato as two-timers.

The .800 club, usually joined by a relative handful of players each year, was not so exclusive in 2012. This achievement was accomplished 14 times this year. This was probably due to hotter bats allowed this year, combined with better balls that the club began using in 2011.

As expected, allowing the use by seniors of higherperformance bats at the Complex produced a substantial upswing in power numbers. Over-the-fence clouts easily surpassed previous years since the Golden Seniors moved to fenced fields at the Complex. (See Page 2) NEXT GENERAL MEETING: JANUARY 2013

L4 (Wednesday night) had 82 home runs, 35 of them clearing the 300-foot fences. L5 (Thursday night) had 89 homers and probably as many or more over the fences as the players are at least as strong as L4. L3 (Tuesday night) had 69 homers with an unknown number of over-the-fence blasts but probably about one-third the number of L4 or L5.

The most prodigious fence-busting HR hitters include Lyman Rose, Jarvis Quenga and Steve Schuler in the night leagues. Long-time club-leading sluggers Rich Ganas and Monta Litle either played in only one league or did not play a full season, and Monte Miller played in only two leagues.

The Tuesday morning leagues, for age 60 and over, had these HR numbers: L2 -- 78 homers, three over the fence by Dave Avery; L6 -- 67 HR, six over the fences, 5 by Jon Ellison and 1 by Rich Edwards. (It should be noted that Avery, Ellison and Edwards are all over 65 years old.)

Lyman Rose tied a club record and set a new L5 record with 10 home runs despite an abbreviated regular-season schedule. Rose also led double-digit HR leaders with 16, Joe Cors and Jarvis Quenga had 15, Terry Urban 12, Monte Miller, Dave Vargo and Emilio Lobato had 11 while Howard Toder and Bill McMahon had 10.

Quenga set a club record with 67 RBI in L4.

L6: Rich Edwards .882, Dave Vargo .846, Vidal Franco .775. Bill Greene had 62 hits, Edwards 60 and Carl Maryland 56. Joe Cors had 8 HR; Jon Ellison, JC Terry, Edwards and Greene 5. Ellison had 63 RBI, Cors 57 and Greene 51.

L-3: On Sept. 25, Mike Viduya's towering drive over the fence, a three-run blow in the bottom of the sixth inning, powered Manager Bob Smartt's Livingston Concrete to a thrilling 13-12 victory over Fuddruckers, managed by Dave Vargo, for the Tuesday Night championship. The stands were packed with cheering Fudd fans, but their team, led by the club's regular season home run leader, Lyman Rose, couldn't quite pull off an upset of the hard-hitting cement mixers. Livingston also won a 16-15 thriller from Fuddruckers in the first round of the double-elimination playoffs.

L-4: In the Wednesday Night championship slugfest on Sept. 26, Manager Bud de Souza's Denny's defeated Bertolucci's Body and Fender, co-managed by Hal Johnson and Russ Barnes, 30-27. It was described as a "team effort." Johnson hit the game's only overthe-fence home run, while his teammates knocked seven other balls over the fence that counted as ground-rule singles. Denny's hit no over-the-fence homers but in their six innings of batting, produced five runs per inning. As the home team, they did not have an open inning. Denny's batters made only six outs in the entire game as they rained mostly singles over the infield. De Souza said he asked his team not to hit the ball over the fence as it would open the door for the powerful fender-fixers to get another fence-clearing home run. Johnson said later that this strategy frustrated his team. He was on second base when a teammate cleared the fence, but, unless forced, he could not even advance to third base. Thus Denny's hits within the park proved to be more productive. (Rules prevent a team from hitting a second homer until the other team connects.) Top hitters for Denny's included Dan Norton, five hits and four RBI, and Walt Strickland, three doubles and five RBI. Bertolucci's Mel Tennyson had a monster game, driving in eight runs with three singles (one over the fence), a double and a sacrifice fly. Johnson drove in six teammates and pitcher Bud Lesorge had five hits and three RBI. The game ended on a great fielding play by Strickland, who snared Barnes' bid for a hit, stepped on second and threw to first.

L-5: Miller's Munchies, led by Manager Monte Miller, edged Overhead Door, 12-11, in the Thursday Night League championship game. Overhead Door was managed by Don Jackson. Jay Aguas' single in the seventh drove home Rich Ganas for the victory. Jim Liston of Miller's had two solo shots over the fence, while Bill Conwell cleared the fence in the sixth inning for Overhead.

L-6: In a stunning comeback from a 15-5 deficit, Russ Barnes' fifth-seeded Mark White DDS won the Tuesday 10:30 a.m. league title, 20-19, over Lasereyes.com. Tom Sansone sprinted home with the winning run on Barnes' grounder, beating Dave Vargo's throw by a step or two, in the bottom of the seventh inning. Sixth-seeded Lasereyes was managed by Dave Bristol. Top hitters: Joe Cors led Mark White with two doubles and a three-run homer, driving in five runs. Ron Roach also had five RBI with a double and three singles. Vic Torres had five hits for the winners. Lasereyes' Bill Ferguson had two singles and two doubles, driving in four runs, and Dave Vargo had a single, double and three-run homer. Barnes won two championship shirts as he also played on the winning L-2 team earlier in the day.

I'm sure I have left out some of the "behind the scenes" people who help this club operate, and I must apologize for that. As you can see, there is a real team effort by many people who make this club what it is. We owe them all a big THANK YOU!

Board Boosts Pay of Umpires and Scorekeepers; No Dues Increase

The Board of Directors has approved more pay for the club's umpires and scorekeepers. Umpires in 2013 will receive a \$3 increase to \$25 per game. Scorekeeper pay will be \$12, an increase of \$2 per game. The umpires and scorekeepers requested the increase, which was granted by the board which noted there had not been an increase in several years. For the approximately 380 games, the board budgeted \$14,000 to pay umpires and scorekeepers in 2013. This represents an increase of \$1,900 over the 2012 season.

The club ended the 2012 fiscal year with a slight surplus and had considered reducing dues. However, with the higher per-game rate for umpires and scorekeepers, the board decided to maintain the level of dues for 2013. Each \$5 in dues represents about \$2,500 to the club.

First-Come, First-Served Rule for League Drafts is Adopted for 2013

The Board of Directors in August repealed the club's league draft priority rule (Standing Rule 13) and replaced it with a process that will accept player applications for all leagues on a first-come, first-served basis. The date that an application is received by the player agent is the sole determination of whether the player will be eligible for a league draft. No longer will there be a confusing system of ranking players that could prevent players from being on draft lists for all requested leagues.

Any new application or renewal application received before Dec.1 will be admitted to the draft in any league requested. Those applications received after the Dec. 1 due date will be admitted to drafts based on the date the player agent receives the application. For example, if L-2 has room for 72 players, all those applications received by Dec. 1 will be in the draft. Those received after Dec. 1 will be on a waiting list. If there were 63 applications for L-2 on Dec. 1, then the first nine applications received for that league after Dec. 1 will be on the draft list. The rest go on a waiting list.

Thus, to guarantee being drafted on a team in a league or leagues of the player's choice, it behooves players to get their applications on file by Dec. 1.
