CLUB MEMBERSHIP GROWS: WILL THERE BE MORE TEAMS IN 2014?

(The following coverage of the May 13 general meeting by Dave Vargo provides the basis for the June electronic edition of the Dugout Chatter. The print edition will return in July with plenty of news, including league standings, stats and game highlights. -- Ron Roach, editor.)

Growing pains? GSSCS President Tom Sansone announced at the May 13 general meeting that the club already had 67 new members as of mid-May, an increase of eight over all of 2012 -- and more new members can be expected during the rest of 2013. Sansone said the club's new membership growth has already been about 20 per cent above the average of 50 new members per year -- "and we're not done for the year!"

The club invested in radio advertising and had articles in local print media, and individual members volunteered time to sign up players at shopping centers as part of a campaign to gain more new members. Details of this effort have been reported in previous issues of the Dugout Chatter.

Besides new members, Dick Latimer, the club's first vice president, announced 40 paid sponsors for 2013 and already one new paid sponsorship for 2014. He said his goal is to have 50 paid sponsorships next year.

In other news:

Coed Membership. The Board of Directors discussed a possible by-laws change to reduce the age limit for females to 40 or 45, instead of 50. Mel Tennyson, commissioner of L-3 on Tuesday nights, reported that there are 18 women in the six-team league -- two teams have four, two teams have three and two teams have two. To gain added exposure, the board discussed offering to pay the \$85 cost for a night league coed or all-star team to play in the city's Tournament of Champions in September at the Complex. NEWS FROM MAY GENERAL MEETING (FROM PAGE 1)

Expansion. The board and L-3 would welcome the challenge of adding teams to the league. Similarly, Larry Shelton, a L-3 manager, and Dick Reisinger, a L-4 (Wednesday night) manager, reported that all teams in those leagues have at least 13 players. Additional teams would reduce bench time for all players. It would ease the burden on managers by making it easier to comply with the club edict that each player play at least three innings on defense.

Club Picnic. Mark your calendars: Saturday, Sept. 7 at Howe Park. Bill Hill, L-3 player whose business sponsors two teams, has volunteered to chair the event.

Club Officer Nominations. John Mizerak will chair the committee that will produce nominations to be announced at the July 8 general meeting for the seven Board of Director positions -- president, first VP, second VP, Club Commissioner, Player Agent, Secretary and Treasurer. The election will be in August. Filling the vacant second VP position is crucial. This officer is responsible for planning and ordering uniform jerseys, hats and equipment, including balls.

Rules. There was discussion of the baseline length and use of a scoring plate. Sansone noted that batting averages increased by over 50 basis points in 2012 with the addition of hotter bats and use of Trump balls. He closed the discussion by indicating that the club will look at batting averages and runs scored over all of 2013 before reviewing whether the club would continue to play under Senior Softball USA's 2013 regulation that added five feet to the distance between bases for all GSSCS leagues except the Monday morning L-1 for players 70 and older.

The club will attempt to obtain and use more secure scoring plates that won't slip. About 70 percent of the 30-plus members on hand favored elimination of the plate. (The scoring line would be used so that runners would still be declared out for touching the regular home plate.) #

REST IN PEACE: BOB HONDA

Honorary Life Member **Bob Honda** passed away peacefully on April 18 and has been remembered by many -- including Mayor Kevin Johnson -- whose lives he touched on the ball fields and coaching sidelines. The native of Hawaii was a major force behind the Islanders softball tournament team. He also pitched for championship teams in the Golden Seniors before he suffered strokes and could no longer play.

Mayor Johnson said Coach Honda saved his basketball career. According to an article in the May 4 Sacramento Bee by Joe Davidson, Johnson was a sophomore guard on the Sacramento High junior varsity when, after a defeat, he decided he wanted to quit. "I wanted out, but Bob Honda wouldn't let me. It would have changed my life." Honda was a teacher, coach and counselor for 37 years in the Sacramento City School District. He was 74 when he died of a heart attack.

Honda and Varsity Coach Ron McKenna considered Johnson the fastest baseline-to-baseline player they had ever seen, the Bee reported. When recruiters came to evaluate players in the area, Honda advised them to look at Johnson. Kevin went to Cal-Berkeley and then to the National Basketball Association for a 12-year career.

The mayor said the values instilled in him by Honda helped him as he worked to keep the Sacramento Kings from moving to Seattle. "You see the role he played with me, even in this fight to keep the Kings here. Coach Honda's tenacity is still with me. It's helped me. Never quit, keep fighting."

GSSCS directors decided in 2011 to make Honda an honorary life member as his failing health kept him from achieving enough years of membership. #
