HIGH BATTING AVERAGES AND HOMERS SPICE FIRST-HALF GOLDEN SENIORS PLAY

Bill (Iron Man) McMahon, at least statistically, has been tearing up two night leagues with plus .800 batting averages. Meanwhile, Rich Edwards was leading a Tuesday morning league with an astounding .900 batting average.

And balls are flying over fences at the Complex, particularly in the night leagues as the club nears the mid-season mark.

In games through the week of June 4, McMahon was pacing the Tuesday night (L-3) with an .840 average. Emilio Lobato had six long balls. The Silver Cats, led buy McMahon and Steve Schuler (four homers) were in first place at 8-2-1, barely ahead of the 8-3 George L Klumpp team. Geremia Pools was 6-6, Livingston Concrete 5-6-1, Rapid Solutions 4-8, and Tanner & Associates, 3-9. Klumpp boasted four of the league's 10 top hitters, Allen Riker (.824), Tim Brown (.760), and two women, Sharyn Ruff (.750) and Lyn Brown (.734).

McMahon had an .850 average to lead the John Brendle Consultants to a 7-2-1 record, just behind the 8-2 Espanol #2 team, which had four of the top 10 batters in the Thursday night (L-5) league. Joining McMahon on the Brendle team, Anthony Maze hammered seven balls over the fences while hitting . 813. Mike Viduya of Bill Hill Heating and Air was hitting .833 with four homers; Lyman Rose of Tri-C Machine Co., an .800 hitter, cleared the fences six times in eight games. Espanol was led by Dick Reisinger, Larry Lagomarsino, Jarvis Quenga and Kent Ramos, all hitting between .750 and .793. Tri-C was in third place at 4-5-1, followed by Reinwald Health/Dental and Bill Hill, both 4-6, and Overhead Door, 2-8.

Terry Urban's .879 led the Wednesday night (L-4) through 11 games, followed by Vernon Nickell and Don Jackson, both at .867. Jarvis Quenga hit .854. Urban also had four homers over the fences. Standings: Bertolucci's 9-2, Cottonwood Estates 8-3, Bill Hill #1 6-5, Executive Limousine 6-5, C&C Plumbing 3-8, and Ryan R. Wilgus 2-9. Sam Hernandez hit for the cycle on March 27. (See Page 2)
