GOLDEN SENIORS CLUB LOWERS AGE REQUIREMENT FOR WOMEN PLAYERS

By a show of hands, a clear majority of about 50 members at the Aug. 12 general meeting amended Golden Seniors softball by-laws to reduce by five years the age requirement for women players.

President Tom Sansone urged support of the by-law change, saying expanded opportunity "is a good thing" for the club, suggesting that the club could even expand from six to eight teams on Tuesday nights at the Sacramento Softball Complex.

The by-law change, proposed at the July general meeting, allows women applicants for membership in the three night leagues, which have been for 50 and over, to qualify when they are turning 45 during the calendar year. For the two Tuesday morning leagues, which have a threshold of 60, women can be 55. For the 70-and-over league on Monday mornings, women can play when they will be 65 during the year starting next January. Exceptions may be requested and require approval by the Board of Directors.

While women can play in any of the leagues, they have generally signed up for the Tuesday night league at the Complex. There are 18 women playing on the six Tuesday night teams.

Ray Mendonsa, former club president, said he has been an "expert witness" in court cases involving discrimination and he warned of exposure to gender and/or age discrimination complaints. Alan Aufill, who has a law degree, disagreed. He said he doubts there would be complaints resulting in any real harm to the club.

To those who fear that an influx of younger women could reduce opportunities for men, Sansone said if enough women sign up there would be the possibility of adding more teams or leagues. The club now has six leagues with 40 teams.

In July, when the proposed By-Law was changed from a 10-year reduction to five years, Sansone said this represented a compromise because it would be difficult to get the membership to approve 10 years. He also (See Page 2) NEXT GENERAL

said the lower age for women has been advocated by men whose wives have been too young to play.

Seventh League in the Works. Assuming enough signups occur, the club would add a seventh league in 2014 for players 70 and over (65 for women). The Board of Directors approved the preparation of 2014 player renewal and new player applications with the option of the seventh league. (See Henry Low's article elsewhere in this newsletter reporting on a survey of members indicating support for a new league.)

Low, who is commissioner of L1, stressed at the meeting that the new L7 is not a "select" league. It is considered more of a "transition or gateway" to L1. He said he does not want to see L1 weakened by a rival league. Yet he sees L1 with too many players and teams, presenting management problems. Projections are that there will be even more 70+ players signing up in years ahead. The number of players drafted for L7 would be limited to four or five teams and undrafted L7 signups would be in the draft for L1.

A major argument by Low in favor of expansion is that 47% of the 414 players currently assigned to teams are 70 or older and only one of six existing leagues is devoted to those who are 70-plus years old.

In other general meeting news:

Election of Officers. Curtis Holcomb was re-elected to a third one-year term as Club Commissioner, out-polling Jerry Nevis in the only contested race for a seat on the Board of Directors. Jim Wait is the only new member of the board, running unopposed for 2nd Vice President. on a slate prepared by the nominating committee, led by John Mizerak. Wait succeeds Pete Ward, who resigned. The other five board members on the slate: Sansone will serve a third year as club president. Also re-elected are 1st Vice President Dick Latimer, Treasurer Don Wall, Secretary Dave Tanner, and Player Agent Myron Dahl.

Playoffs. The three night leagues launched their playoffs Aug. 13-15 and will have their championship games on the nights they play. The day leagues will have their championship games on Saturday morning, Sept. 7 at Howe Park in conjunction with the club's annual picnic and general meeting. There also will be an All-Star game involving players chosen by Tuesday night, L3 managers.

There was an opening for one All-Star game in addition to the championship games for the three day leagues on the two Howe Park fields. Commissioners for the Wednesday and Thursday night leagues did not express interest, Club Commissioner Holcomb said.

Sept. 7 Schedule. Leagues 2 and 6 will play on Howe Park Field #1 at 9 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. The League 3 All-Star game is set for 9 a.m. on Field #2, followed by the L1 championship game.

Picnic. Bill Hill, chairman of the Picnic Committee, said the limit for meals has been increased from 200 at last year's picnic to 250. GSSCS members and their spouse or significant other are free; additional guests will be charged, probably \$5. Hill said the same caterer who did such a great job last year will serve tri-tip, chicken, baked beans and potato salad. Bob and Trudy Smartt handled the set-up chores and Jim Wait led the cleanup crew last year and appeared to be willing to step up again. Lou Coppola suggested that the club have a raffle with great prizes. (See Page 3)

Budget. Treasurer Wall presented a budget which reduces 2014 club dues by \$5. There also will be no separate lighting fee for night leagues. The cost for playing in a night league will be reduced to \$125 from \$130. Wall said the board is still working on the amount to charge for a player's additional leagues. The budget for the fiscal year starting Oct. 1 was approved, including \$2,000 for recruitment efforts. The club had more than \$100,000 in the bank but most of that is already committed to pay field fees. The \$5 dues reduction will amount to about \$2,500. The picnic budget is \$4,500.

Player Applications. Player Agent Dahl said he is redesigning the forms to make them "more simple for you and for me." Renewal forms will be mailed to all members and new player applications may be requested. They also will be available on the club's web site, www.gsscs.org.

Sponsors. Latimer said he has a goal of 50 sponsorships for 2014. Latimer challenges each member to recruit a sponsor based on a business relationship. For example, he noted that he has signed up a mortuary (Klumpp's Chapel of Flowers) that has buried half his family over the years.

Safety. J.C. Terry, club safety coordinator, said players need to be careful when throwing or tossing bats so they do not endanger umpires (or catchers). #

CLUB BOARD SETS STAGE FOR NEW 70+ LEAGUE

The GSSCS Board of Directors, meeting Aug. 12, considered surveys of all playing club members age 70+ and agreed to add a new league for 70+ players to the player applications for the 2014 season.

Approximately 140 surveys were distributed to League One (L1) players and 109 surveys were returned. Also, 50 surveys were mailed to players age 70+ in other leagues, who are not presently playing in L1 and 23 of those surveys were returned. A total of 132 surveys (69%) were returned and there appears to be a lot of interest in adding a new L7 for 70+ players. Some of the survey results follow:

1. Preferred League?

Preferred L1: 54. Preferred Both L1 and L7: 38 Total = 92

Preferred New L7: 25. Preferred Both: 38 Total = 63

2. Should L1 and L7 Play the Same Day?

Same Day = 47 (56%)

Different Days = 37 (44%)

3. If L1 Plays Monday and L7 a Different Day?

Tuesday = 52 and (Wed – Fri) = 46 (53% prefer Tuesday over the combined Wed. – Friday)

4. Preferred Park, if L1 and L7 Play on the Same Day?

Howe Park = (54%) Sacramento Softball Complex = (46%)

Why is this new league needed?

- 1. Of the 414 players assigned to teams this year, 196 or (47%) are age 70 or older and 218 or (53%) are younger than age 70. This means that as players age into their seventies (presently 47% of all players), there is only one league for them to choose as their skills diminish and they can no longer compete with players 10 and 20 years younger in leagues 2 through 6.
- 2. Some of the rule changes in recent years (hot bats and 70-foot base paths) make it more difficult for older players to compete in the leagues for younger players.
- 3. The new L7 would serve as a transitional league for players age 70+ to move from the younger leagues to begin playing with their 70+aged peers. This is confirmed by the total number of players (63) from all current leagues, who expressed interest in the new L7.
- 4. Finally, this new L7, along with our present L1, will give all players age 70+ choices between L1 and L7 or both, depending on their preferences.

LEAGUE STANDINGS AND BATTING LEADERS

BERTOLUCCI'S IS L-4 TOP SEED ENTERING PLAYOFFS

With a 15-3 regular-season record, Bertolucci's began the L-4 Wednesday night playoffs as the top seed. Cottonwood Estates finished 12-6, followed by Executive Limousine (10-8), Bill Hill #1 (9-9), C&C Plumbing (6-12), and Ryan R. Wilgus (3-15). L-4 playoffs were scheduled to begin on Aug. 14. Leading hitters: Jarvis Quenga (.823), Don Jackson (.804), and Emilio Lobato (.797). Marcus Kirkland led the league with 51 RBI and was the top home run hitter with six, four of them clearing the fences. Terry Urban also had four fence-clearing clouts. Vernon Nickell had 11 triples while Lobato and Quenga each produced 16 doubles.

SILVER CATS FINISH FIRST IN L-3

Losing only three of 18 games, with two ties, the Silver Cats captured the top seed for the L-3 Tuesday night playoffs, beginning Aug. 13. George L. Klumpp (11-6-1) finished second, followed by Livingston Concrete (8-9-2), Geremia Pools (8-11) Rapid Solutions (7-11-1) and Tanner & Associates (6-13). Tanner's Emilio Lobato led the league in hitting for the regular season at .790. He also led the league in homers (7) and, with Larry Elsberry of Geremia, in RBI with 47.

JOHN BRENDLE CONSULTANTS EDGE ESPANOL #2 IN L-5

John Brendle Consultants (12-4-1) squeaked ahead of Espanol Italian Restaurant (12-5) for the top seed in the L-5 Thursday night playoffs. Anthony Maze paced the Brendle club with a league-leading nine homers. Reinwald Health/Dental Insurance finished third at 8-9, followed by Tri-C Machine Company (7-8-2), Bill Hill Heating & Air Conditioning (7-10), and Overhead Door, 3-13-1. The league's leading hitter was Mike Swanson of Tri-C (.795), followed by teammate Lyman Rose (.788 with eight home runs). Mike Viduya, a .771 hitter, led the league in RBI with 48.

SPORTS LEISURE ROMPS

Mike Mayer led the league with three inside-the-park homers. Ellison and Jay Aguas had one homer clear the fences.
