VARGO AND KNUTSON ARE NEW VEEPS

President Tom Sansone's interim appointments of Dave Vargo and Chuck Knutson to serve as club vice presidents were approved by the membership at the Jan. 13 general meeting.

Sansone also announced that due to tournament scheduling, the Board of Directors must rework the club playing schedule which earlier had been set to conclude with championship playoffs at an Oct. 4 picnic.

In other news, it was reported that the club's telephone hotline has been off line while Don Shank works to incorporate an upgrade. Stay tuned.

And player signups appear to be going at a pace to allow a seventh league, which would be played for more competitive 70-plus players following the League 1 games on Monday mornings at Howe Park.

New VEEPs. Vargo added the first vice president title to his list of duties, which also include serving as commissioner of two leagues, L2 and L6 on Tuesday mornings. As first vice president, a position he has held before, Vargo is responsible for recruiting and maintaining some 40 team sponsors. He succeeds Dick Latimer, who resigned due to health reasons but is continuing to help recruit more sponsors.

Knutson, a five-year veteran of the club, has agreed to take on the post of second vice president, which was vacated when Jim Wait, elected to the position last August, decided that the duties would be too much in conflict with personal commitments. Pete Ward, who did not seek reelection last summer after serving as second VP for many years, stepped up to make sure that orders were placed for uniform shirts in time for the 2014 season.

All seven positions on the board of directors are subject to elections each August. (See Page 4)

Ernest Edward Santiago, a founding member of the Golden Seniors Softball Club, passed away on Jan. 6, just four days before his 92nd birthday.

John Santiago recalls his grandfather as "one of the originals" of the club, one of the first seven to sign up.

He was known as a strong-hitting first-baseman, according to John and others who knew him. "I attended many of his games as a child. He loved everything about this league. This kept him active during retirement. I'm sure he would have played longer but it hurt his knees too much. He was a great hitter but his knees only allowed for singles and doubles."

A Golden Seniors life member, Ernie batted cleanup until 1994 when he could no longer play ball due to his knees. He also played hardball and was known as a great fan of Notre Dame athletics, though he never attended the Indiana university.

"He is well-remembered and was well-liked by everybody. He was a true gentleman," recalled George Hodsdon, veteran club member.

In 1976, according to a published club history, Ted Larson, then 72 and generally recognized as the lead organizer of the group, responded to a notice from the city recreation department inquiring if there was interest among 50-and-over players to form a team for senior citizens. They began with batting and fielding practices at Land Park. It was described as a great year as there were no club officers, no minutes of meetings, "some arguments and a lot of fun."

Fourteen men participated in those 1976 practices, including Ernie Santiago. Volume 1 of the club newsletter, dated April 1983, included a brief organizational history and listed Santiago among 37 charter members in 1979 when the club was officially incorporated as a non-profit organization. In that first year, pick-up teams were formed among those who showed up for practices. A traveling all-star squad, including Santiago, went to Las Vegas and Florida for tournaments. In 1980, as membership grew, regular teams were formed and league play began under the lights at Tahoe Park.

In 1979, the Golden Seniors helped inaugurate the first National Senior Citizens Softball Tournament in Las Vegas, and Santiago was among 15 players representing the club. John said that his grandfather's scrapbook noted that he was a team tournament MVP.

A Golden Senior poem about that 1979 team, by fellow founding member Milo Gates, was printed in the Golden Seniors History, Volume One, in January 1984, describing the 1979 road trips. To wit: "Then there was Ernie the Kid; Nobody knows what he did; He dressed up in style; And wore a big smile; But the girls ran off and hid."

Ernie graduated from high school in Hawaii and, starting in 1940 worked as a civilian for the navy on Ford Island, Pearl Harbor. He was there when the Japanese attacked in 1941. He served from 1943 to 1945 in the "Pineapple Army." After the war, he returned to work as a civilian for the U.S. government and wound up at McClellan AFB, retiring in 1974.

Was Santiago the last living charter member? According to the January 1984 Golden Seniors history, the following 37 men held membership cards as of July 1979 and were declared charter members at a club meeting: Joe Bettencourt, C.B. Brady, Frank Chico, Alden Clark, Bill Clark, Wayne Crary, Bud Ehlers, Fir Galli, Milo Gates, Lyle Hummel, Ed Jagla, Glenn Kelly, Jim Knoble, Ted Larson, Larry Lawston, Charles Lee, Russ Menke, Harold Moos, Joe Moreno, Adron Murphy, Don McPherson, Phil Nasca, Sam Patti, Pete Pina, Tony Pina, Fred Rainey, Gean Rockhill, Ernie Santiago, Charles Sass, Cliff Shirk, George Smith, Deni Treaster, Joe Virgen, Bud Weygandt, Dave Williams, Tom Witcher, Steve Zupan. Also, the University of Arizona has produced a CPR video that that notes mouth-tomouth resuscitation is no longer advised, except for infants or small children or someone who is drowning. You can see the video promoting "continuous chest compressions CPR at http://heart.arizona.edu/cpr-video.

Especially for those who have not been working out over the winter, it is time to begin stretching exercises and other activity that will help you avoid straining or pulling muscles on the playing fields.

Staying hydrated is very important the older we get. Even when the weather is cold and damp, and you may not feel thirsty, the importance of drinking water cannot be overstated. #

2014 Playing Schedule. Sansone and the board had focused on an Oct. 4 seasonending picnic but now must consider changes to avoid conflicts with major non-club tournaments. The board noted that the Oct. 4 date conflicts with the Senior Softball USA World Masters in Las Vegas. There also is a SSUSA "last-chance" qualifier Sept. 20-21 in Yuba City. And the World Senior Games in St. George, Utah also are in early October, followed by another SSUSA national tourney in Phoenix.

If the club decides again to end the season earlier in September, complaints could be expected from those who are not on tournament teams. Another option is to start the regular season earlier. Last year's schedule limited L-1 players on Monday mornings to as few as 16 games, prompting considerable grumpiness.

Picnic Site. There continues to be support to move the picnic back to the Complex where there are more fields available for playoff games -- as long as the club can negotiate reasonable terms and the dates are available.

Sponsorships. Vargo reported 29 paid sponsorships -- one of them (Yancy Company) being new -- and many of those yet to send in their checks are sponsorships from individual club members. Most of the businesses are paid up.

Balls. Knutson said the club will order the same type of ball (Trump "Evil") that have been used in recent years. Additional, smaller balls, will be used in L-3 (Tuesday nights) when women are batting.

Signups. Player Agent Myron Dahl reported 24 new members -- only one of them being a woman -- so far. This is somewhat surprising since the board has lowered the age requirement for women starting this season so they can be five years younger than the threshold for men.

Dahl said L-1 had 96 signups, followed by 76 for L-2, 72 for L-6, and 41 for L-7. Those are day leagues -- Mondays at Howe Park for L-1 and the new L-7; Tuesday mornings for L-2 and L-6. Night league signups: 49 for Tuesday night, 42 for Wednesday night, 49 for Thursday night.

League Commissioners. Club Commissioner Curtis Holcomb said Russ Barnes has been appointed commissioner of L-4, succeeding Bud DeSouza, and Dave Vargo will be commissioner of both L-2 and L-6 on Tuesday mornings, continuing in one league while succeeding Bill Greene in L-6. Other commissioners are Mel Tennyson in L-3 and Allen Riker in L-5.

L-1 Commissioner Henry Low said the L-7 commissioner has yet to be determined.

Drafts. Managers will draft teams for the day leagues at Howe Park on Feb. 18. L-1 at 9 a.m., L-2 at 11 a.m. and L-6 at 1 p.m. No time has been set for L-7, which is expected to have only four teams. Night league drafts have not yet been scheduled. #

THIRTEEN LIFE MEMBERS ARE HONORED

Life membership honors were bestowed on 13 Golden Seniors at the January general meeting as the program's emcee, Jim Lortz, noted that the group has grown from 11 in 1996 to 153 today.

Lortz, sporting a tuxedo as the emcee of the Life Member program for the 13th straight year, opened by saying, "As I said last year, and I'll say it every year, being a life member in clubs like this usually means only the *few* and the *lucky*. But these ballplayers here this evening have proven to be the exceptions!"

To be eligible for life membership, you have to have 15 years of continuous service and be at least 75, or 10 years at age 80.

This year's inductees: Guy Anderson, Larry Campbell, Bill Enos, Hank Fontes, Don Maciel, Darrel McRorie, Mervin Mill, Wil Nishina, Don Pooler, George Rupp, Joe Saiz, Bob South, Larry Utberg.

Anderson, legendary Cordova High School coach, is turning 82 this year and is in his 10th GSSCS season. He said the club "has given me the enjoyment of reuniting with former fast pitch softball players and the fun of playing with umpires (John and Norm Blackwell) who had called many Cordova games that I coached. This will be his 44th season as baseball coach at Cordova and he said he needs six wins to reach 900 for his career. "No matter how old you get, you never lose that desire to play," he said.

Campbell, 80, joined the club in 2005, and did not attend the meeting. Lortz noted that he has played with and against Larry and "we have also shared some thoughts and attitudes together on several different occasions ... " Larry has been an outspoken and sometimes tenacious advocate for additional playing opportunities for players as they grow older, creating a Thursday morning league at Carmichael Park and touting Hooters as a team sponsor.

Enos, who joins Anderson as a member of the LaSalle Baseball Hall of Fame, will be 75 this year, his 25th in the club. He also has played tournament ball for 23 years, currently with the national powerhouse San Francisco Seals. He joined the Golden Seniors playing with Norm Blackwell's team and added that he has had "nothing but fun ever since. Thank you very much."

Fontes, 75, is a 25-year member who said he thanks God that "we can play the game we love so much" and also to thank his wife, Rachel, "because she said, 'You can go play ball." Hank, addressing the members attending the meeting, added, "Keep playing, guys, because, I'll tell you what, there's not another game like this in the world." Hank also has worked as an umpire and on the club's annual picnic. He was the club's Man of the Year in 2006.

Maciel, 81, a 10-year member: "I enjoy playing with everybody here, and I've paid my (2014) dues. I am ready to go!"

Mill, 75, joined the club 22 years ago. He also stated that playing at his age "is such a blessing!" He won a national championship ring in 2009, playing with the Renegades. Mill said he couldn't think of any funny stories, but "some people could say just watching us play at times is humorous enough."

Nishina, 75, is a 17-year member. was asked how many teams he has played for, and he deadpanned: "That's a trick question." My best team? "It is just amazing to be playing at this age" and to all the team managers and club leaders, he said he is grateful to "play ball with all of you."

Rupp, 83, an 11-year member, said he "thoroughly enjoys" playing ball and his biggest hero is Bill Riehl. "He's 92 and still playing." (See Page 6)

South, 81 this year and a 10-year member, has spent 44 years in the service of the Air Force, 27 on active duty and 17 in civil service at McClellan AFB. He has been on three championship teams in his 10 years of playing Monday mornings.

Utburg, 82, played 25 years in Placerville, where he became a life member, before "coming down the hill" to civilization. Now he qualifies as a double-dipping life member. He said being 82 isn't old, it us "un-young," though in 2014 his footspeed will still have to be timed with a sun dial. He conquered prostate cancer in 1996 and hopes his recent lack of energy will be solved by the blood vessel stent installed last December. (Lortz said that, he, too, has battled prostate cancer and concluded treatment a year ago. His PSA now tests as zero, he said with a big smile.)

Unable to attend due to illness, Saiz, 76, said his "overall experience has been an outstanding fulfillment of good fellowship with my fellow players." He said he had never played slow-pitch softball until the year he turned 50. "A big thank you to the many Golden Senior officers and board members, past and present. Job well done." Saiz also is known as the builder of a field of dreams, a diamond on his Citrus Heights property where many a youngster has polished their fielding abilities or used his batting cage.

McRorie, 75, is a 23-year member who could not attend the meeting due to health problems. The former all-conference baseball player at Sacramento State is a retired Naval Reserve officer with two combat tours of Vietnam, a secret tour in Area 51 (Nevada), and service on ships and on an admiral's staff. He also is a retired business and computer teacher. Darrel has battled serious health issues to continue playing at a quality defender at third base and a dangerous hitter.

Pooler, 75, is a 15-year member. He spends the winter at his summer residence -- in Brazil. #
